Pastor's Pen

Celebrating Recovery

Greetings Church! Love you Church! For more than two years I have been on a journey to get a life-changing recovery ministry started at FSBC. Believing that God wants to use recovery ministry to grow and build our church through changed lives, I have been developing relationships



with others who have been involved in a ministry called Celebrate Recovery. We have done some group studies and shared experiences that have been leading us toward the launching of our own CR program.

The long journey is about to take an exciting turn! We are going to launch our own Celebrate Recovery ministry on Tuesday nights at 6:30, starting May 3rd . I hope **you** will consider being a part of it. Not that you will merely spread the word, but participate. This is not a ministry for "those people." We are "those people."

You may think recovery is only for drug addicts and alcoholics—people whose lives seem out of control. But that's just not true. The Bible teaches that all of us have addictions in our lives. Sin is addicting, and the Bible says, "all have sinned." Not one of us is perfect and without need of change in our lives. We've all blown it; we've all made mistakes. We've hurt ourselves, we've hurt other people, and others have hurt us.

Because of sin, each of us needs repentance and recovery in order to live the way God intended. That's why, years ago, our sister church in California, Saddleback Church, developed a Biblical recovery program based on the Beatitudes of Jesus. They named the program Celebrate Recovery.

Take it from Teri, a believer who struggles with co-dependency and finances, as she tells her story:

I was raised in a "normal" family. My parents worked hard to make ends meet, providing a safe, comfortable home for my brother and me. But we were never quite up to the standard of the neighborhood we lived in. If there had been railroad tracks dividing our town, we would have been living just over the line on the "wrong" side. I never could keep up with the kids from those families who had "made it." I attended church and knew that God loved me, but I never realized I could develop a day-to-day relationship with Christ.

I met the love of my life in high school, and we were married a few years later. He was on the fast track in his career, spending most of his time at work and moving quickly up the corporate ladder. We were regularly moving into bigger homes in better neighborhoods. Three children and several relocations later, we found ourselves moving into the big house on the hill. This to me was the ultimate. We had the view, the pool, the basketball court, the horse property, a great income and a wonderful family. Life was good.

While I was busy enjoying a lavish lifestyle, though, and spending every penny on whatever impulse purchase I wanted, my husband's business began to slow, almost to the point of closing. His income suddenly dropped to next to nothing. He worked harder than ever though, and was rarely at home during waking hours. The credit cards were maxed out, bills kept pouring in and our savings was quickly depleted. I was accustomed to frequent phone calls offering new products, travel destinations or easy credit terms for purchasing the next, best "thing." But now the calls were increasingly from creditors who not so politely requested the next payment. No longer able to keep up with the neighbors, we were quickly left behind socially.

We lost the house on the hill and moved into a rental unit. From the depths of despair at losing all of the material extras and lifestyle privileges I thought were so important, I cried out to God for help.

A woman at work befriended me and invited me to church. I began attending, and hearing God's Word brought me a glimmer of hope. I began to focus on His Word and what I had to be grateful for, taking with a grain of salt what my creditors and the world were telling me

This was a major step for me because the message I thought I was getting from "the

world" was to run away from my creditors and my marriage. I chose God's way instead, opting to concentrate on my wonderful family; my health; my church family; and my vital, growing relationship with my Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Like the poor widow in Luke 21, I had nothing to give by the world's standards, but I stepped out in faith and offered myself to God. When I didn't have enough money to pay the bills, I was obedient and offered the first 10 percent to God. It was the least I could do. He was there for me when everything else was falling apart, offering me the peace and security I hadn't found even when I'd been rich in material possessions.

I began to volunteer at church, wanting God to be the top priority in my calendar too. A few hours of service each week brought new friendships and helped me focus on God's work. This volunteer doing involvement also brought me to Celebrate Recovery. At first I didn't think I needed recovery; after all, I was struggling with finances only as a result of a turn in the economy. But I kept attending and soon came to realize that I'd been using money, and what it could buy, to fill a void in my heart, a craving only God could truly satisfy. I'd been trying to buy significance and value to cover up my low self-esteem. Money, and the lifestyle it offered, had proved to be false and fleeting. It had let me down and left me crying and alone. Through Celebrate Recovery I came to see myself as the child of God, someone truly significant in His eyes.

I continue to give of my time, talents and treasure, and I find myself blessed beyond my wildest dreams. God has completely turned my life around. Instead of trying to measure up to the world's standards, I'm content with what I have and anxious to be about God's work. We now own a lovely home. It's not on the hilltop. In fact, it's by the railroad tracks, but it's warm and safe and full of love. My kids have grown to know and love Christ and have been shaped in positive ways by our mutual experiences. I have a wonderful job in ministry that uses my talents and skills and allows me to give back to God in gratitude for all that Christ has done for me. I recognize that everything I

have is first of all a gift from God, and I strive to be a good steward of all that I've been given.

The goal of the Celebrate Recovery program is not simply to recover from past sins and hurts. The goal is to become Christlike in our character. I (Pastor) have leaned into Celebrate Recovery many times to attack some grip sin has on me with the power of Christ in a purposeful, intentional and spiritual process.

So no matter what situation you find yourself in, here's good news: regardless of whether your struggle is emotional, financial, relational, spiritual, sexual or whatever; regardless of what you need help with, *God wants to help you*.

In Isaiah 57:18-19 God says of his people that he has seen how they acted but he will heal them, he will lead them and help them and will comfort those who mourn. So God knows us. He knows where we came from, where we stand today, and where we are going to be tomorrow.. And He says:

- If you've been hurt, "I want to heal you."
- If you're confused, "I want to lead you."
- If you've ever felt you were helpless to change anything, "I want to help you."
- If you've ever felt no one understands your problem, "I want to comfort you."
- If you feel worried or afraid, "I want to offer peace to you."

The reality is that none of us are going to get well on our own. Persistent temptations must be teamtackled through honest, surrendered community with other believers. We need each other for victory. One of Celebrate Recovery's principle verses is James 5:16. "Therefore, confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed." (Italics added for emphasis) We are to bring other trusted brothers and sisters into our struggle so that we can achieve victory and healing. Trying to fix your problems on your own only makes them worse than they were when you started. But there's hope. God is ready and waiting to help you alongside others if you let Him. Will you join the journey and help us Celebrate Recovery through Jesus Christ? You might be surprised at the changes God makes in you, too!

Operation Christmas Child

March is here and the numbers are in, 10,505,155 shoebox gifts collected WORLDWIDE! 9,127,591 shoebox gifts collected in the UNITED STATES!

718,291 shoebox gifts collected in the LOWER MIDWEST! This is our area!

What a great God we serve! Now to set a goal for next year. We collected just over 150 boxes last year as a church. My God-sized goal for this year is 200. I am praying that we as a church body will be able to provide 200 children around the world the opportunity to not only receive a gift but to hear about the greatest gift of all, Jesus Christ.

REACHING THE UNREACHED

In Gabon, the Baka people live on the margins of society and have typically been outside the reach of the Gospel. But that began to change when shoeboxes were given out in a remote village. All 354 children in the community turned out for the festive outreach event and all the adults, too! Everyone listened carefully as they heard the Gospel for the first time and discovered how much God loved them. At the end of the presentation, all of the children—and all of the adults—prayed to receive Jesus as their Lord and Savior! The village chief, who also gave his life to Christ, was so impressed with the event that he set aside some land for a church to be built. Praise God! We also saw God work mightily among several other unreached people groups. The village of Gongonbili, where the Lobi people live in Burkina Faso, was considered a "no-go zone" for the Gospel, due to its reputation for violence against outsiders and its open hostility to Christianity. But *"with God all things are possible"* (Matthew 19:26) and local leaders allowed shoeboxes to be given out to the area children.

"The parents were delighted that someone had thought of bringing gifts to their children and showing them the love of God. They even asked for prayer for themselves," a ministry partner said. "Today, over 30 adults and 50 children attend a new church that was started in the village. God broke into this no-go zone, and now it's a go zone for the Gospel!"

Wow, what an amazing God we serve! Thanks again for all your help and support. This month is a little different. If you like to make things, what we are collecting this month is right up your alley. If you don't like to make/ craft things, then maybe you can buy some items that would allow the child who gets your box the opportunity to make something. I have listed some ideas below. Annie Armstrong Easter Offering

Annual offering named for bold missions leader

Week of Prayer for North American Missions will be held March 6-13. Many Southern Baptist churches collect the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for North American Missions[®] during this time. But who was Annie Armstrong?

Annie Armstrong was a visionary who was a bold missions leader. "When I get hold of an idea that seems to



me to be a good one, I somehow do not feel comfortable until I see it carried out," she said. Annie's father died soon after she was born in 1850. Her mother, a devout Christian, encouraged her five children to see the needs around them and to act. With fervency, Annie devoted herself to compassion ministry. Annie and the women of her church joined with other churches in giving and missions work.

Her boldness soon helped unite the missions movement begun in several states. In 1888 she helped form national Woman's Missionary Union and was elected as its first executive leader. Traveling throughout the United States, Annie encouraged missionaries and challenged churches to give to and support missions. Among her contributions were:

- Hand writing more than 18,000 letters in one year to pastors and SBC leaders advocating for missions
- Paid her own expenses and refused a salary expressing she would "never give to the Lord that which costs me nothing." (2 Samuel 24:24)
- Honored in 1934 when The Home Missions Offering was renamed for her to encourage more to follow her sacrificial example. Annie died Dec. 20, 1938, in Baltimore, but her legacy and heart for missions live on. More than \$2 billion has been given through the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering[®].
