Pastor's Pen

It is important to honor the work of our brothers and sisters in the past who paved the way for our spiritual journey. Faithful men and women of God embraced God's call to labor for the advancement of His Kingdom to extend the reaches of the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ without ever knowing me or you personally. They put actions to Jesus' words in Acts 1:8: "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, and to the ends of the earth." They obeyed the Great Commission in Matthew 28:19-20: "Go into all the world and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them ... and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." They gave of their hearts, prayers, money, and time to build relationships, committees, programs, and even buildings which God used to get the Gospel to people who had not heard yet.

We read in the Bible of the Apostle Paul going into new frontiers proclaiming the Good News of salvation through Jesus Christ. He was sent to those places by the church in Antioch. Acts 13:2-3 says, "As they were worshiping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said, 'Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them.' Then after they had fasted, prayed, and laid hands on them, they sent them off." This is the first phase of the fulfillment of the Acts 1:8 expansion beyond Jerusalem. Saul became known as Paul and spread the Gospel all over the Greek world, converting unbelievers, and establishing churches. The repeating work continued over the next two thousand years by many faithful believers, through trial and threat and martyrdom, to reach us today.

And so here we stand, under the wing of those who have gone before us, enjoying the divine blessings of a relationship with Jesus and other children of God in the body known as First Southern Baptist Church. We have a rich heritage, inspiring examples, and a heavy baton to carry forward.

From the brief church history in our 2005 FSBC Cookbook:

First Southern Baptist Church began as a Mission Chapel, sponsored by First Baptist Church of Burden, Kansas, and was originally called Immanuel Baptist Chapel. June 20, 1954, Immanuel Baptist Chapel became the one hundredth church to be organized in the state of Kansas.

R.H. Maultsy accepted the call to serve as Pastor to the twenty five charter members and all the congregation met in his home, which has been the church parsonage since that time.

The church moved their services to the old junior high school until Mr. O'Brien gave the land, where the church now stands, to the congregation in 1955. In 1957, the church became First Southern Baptist Church. An addition was built in 1979 and they added an elevator in 1997.

Somehow the Gospel made its way to some believers in Oklahoma. Those believers accepted God's call to plant the very first Southern Baptist church in Kansas in Burden. First Baptist Church started to reach others in Burden. They began to see that the Kingdom needed to be expanded to El Dorado and sacrificed their prayers and resources to help our church get started. We owe that church honor and expect that their reward in Heaven will be beautiful to behold.

Sometimes faithful believers have to advance the Kingdom in divergent paths. After partnering to plant churches all over Asia Minor, Paul and Barnabas had to part company. In Acts 15 we read that the two had a disagreement over whether to take along John Mark. Paul refused so Barnabas took John Mark and sailed to Cyprus. Paul chose Silas and went through Syria and Cilicia, strengthening the churches. The partnership was over for a while, but the work of Christ went forward to His glory.

Sadly, our mother church, First Baptist Church of Burden, has decided to leave our convention and association of churches. We will miss their partnership but remain grateful for their faithful labors which have blessed us so very much. May the Kingdom continue to advance through their work and ours!

Speaking of that, our church should also consider how we can take the Gospel to places it has not reached yet. Others have done so for us. We must not let the chain be broken with us.

- 7. My life verse is Acts 20:24 "However, I consider my life worth nothing to me; my only aim is to


finish the race and complete the task the Lord Jesus has given me—the task of testifying to the good news of God's grace."

I grew up in a Christian home with my dad and mom and three siblings. As a kid I always wanted to do what was right and didn't like getting in trouble. The trouble was, that inside, I was in trouble. I was sinning against God and didn't realize it. At the age of seven, I realized that I was doing wrong by God. I went to my mom and talked to her about it. She and my dad helped me see what I needed to do to make it right with God. After making the decision to make Jesus my Lord and Savior, I was baptized by my dad in our small church.

I read my bible and we did family devotions together, and my relationship with God grew a little. I started going to youth group and small groups when I was in high school. When I went to college, I found Christian Challenge and was a part of it. Every stage in my life I have made it a point to find a good Bible believing and teaching church and get involved. I figured if I got involved in the church that would keep me from doing things that would get me in trouble.

Knowing that my children are watching and needing a good example motivates me to read and get to know my God and Savior better. As one of my favorite songs says: "Trust and obey, for there's no other way, to be happy in Jesus, than to trust and obey. "

Mission Moment

Below is a story from The Baptist Press that perfectly illustrates what our Mighty God can accomplish through His people when they listen to His prompting and tell others about Jesus. See Pastor David if you would like more information on how to join a Disaster Relief Team.

By Roger Alford/The Christian Index POUND, Va. – Eddie Johnson had stopped at Robo's Drive-In

restaurant in rural southwest Virginia for a burger and fries, but he got far more than that.

An unexpected encounter with a team of Georgia Baptist Disaster Relief workers at the roadside restaurant would lead to Johnson rededicating his life to Christ and four others accepting Jesus as their Savior.

"Our meeting was no accident," said Johnson, a disabled coal miner who had grown up in church but had strayed away later in life. "It was meant to be. God put them and us here in the same place at the same time for that to happen."

Nearly 40 Georgia Baptists had been deployed to central Appalachia to help in the aftermath of flash flooding that killed 38 people and damaged or destroyed thousands of homes and businesses.

Members of one of the Georgia Baptist crews decided to stop for a quick meal on their way into the flood zone. They found Robo's, a throwback to earlier generations when the custom was to drive in, walk to a small window to place an order, and wait for it to be cooked up. The restaurant's

popularity is reflected in the crowded parking lot where people lean against pickup trucks as they talk and eat.

Robo's has no dining room, but there are two wooden picnic tables off to one side.

Longtime Georgia Baptist Disaster Relief volunteer Chris Fuller took a seat at one of the tables and struck up a conversation with Johnson and his 22-year-old son, Hunter. Fuller's teammates, Ronnie Register and his wife Linda, joined the conversation, which quickly turned to the Gospel.

While Johnson recommitted his life to Christ, Hunter said he wasn't ready to make a decision. After finishing their meals, they went their separate ways. But that wasn't the end of the story.

Back at home that evening, Johnson explained, the conversation with the Georgia Baptists was bearing on Hunter. He couldn't get it Georgia Baptist teams led 17 people off his mind. For a diversion, he looked at Facebook. His feed seemed to be filled with church posts. He looked at TikTok. More of the same. Each one of them seemed to be speaking directly to him.

"He looked at me and, with tears in his eyes, said 'I need to be saved," Johnson said.

It was nearly 10 p.m. The

Johnsons, along with one of Hunter's friends, jumped into a vehicle and drove to Calvary Baptist Church in Pound, where the Georgia Baptists had set up a basecamp. Both Hunter and his friend prayed to receive Christ that night.

Johnson said the Georgia Baptists triggered a domino effect that also led to Hunter's grandmother and his girlfriend making salvation decisions.

Fuller said the Georgia Baptist Disaster Relief volunteers are always vigilant for people with spiritual needs when they've been deployed to disaster areas.

"When people experience the raw power of nature, they can't help but look to God," Fuller said. "In times like that when people are feeling helpless, they realize their need for God."

While in central Appalachia to help with the flood cleanup, to faith in Christ. That makes more than 50 people introduced to Christ by Georgia crews responding to disaster areas since last year.

"We pray for opportunities to share the gospel, not only with actions but with words," Fuller said. "If you pray for those opportunities, then God will give you those opportunities."
