## Pastor's Pen

#### **Greetings Church! I Love You Church!**

As I write this, I am still recovering from the Annual Meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in New Orleans. The trip (16 hours in a van of pastors!! – One way!!) was exhausting, but the experience was great. The best of our Convention was on display, but there are some sobering takeaways. By the way, you can watch all the festivities at Acts2tv.com, looking for the '23 SBC Annual Meeting. Here are some highlights:

- The International Mission Board gave us much to celebrate! We have historically cooperated with our sister churches to send more than 25,000 missionaries around the world. At this year's meeting, we commissioned 79 missionaries to go to foreign lands to take the Gospel to address the world's greatest problem: lostness. Each missionary/couple came before us to tell us why they were going, the church that was sending, and solicit prayer for their requests. Some had to appear as shadows on a screen so that their faces would not be identified via the internet in the lands which are hostile to the Gospel.
- The IMB also unrolled Project 3000. There are currently 3072 UUPG's in our world. That is Unreached, Unengaged People Groups. These tribes have no Gospel witness in them (maybe ever) and likely have no access to the Gospel. The IMB is focusing on them so that Revelation 5:9 can be fulfilled with at least one from every tribe, nation, and tongue experiencing the redemption of our God and worshipping the Lamb in heaven. Project 3000 consists of hiring 100 people each of the next 3 years who will each be assigned 10 of these people groups to research them and pray for a missionary to them. They will research the UUPG's culture, language, literacy, etc. to prepare the way for the ones God calls to the mission field. Might He be calling you to become a researcher or a missionary?
- The North American Mission Board is working hard to get churches and campus ministries reaching the 278,000,000 lost people in North America because "It's all about the Gospel." Annie Armstrong giving is up 27% since 2010 and we have planted 10,000 new churches. These churches are responsible for nearly one fourth of all SBC baptisms. We expect a full onethird of all our 2030 churches in the SBC to have been started after 2010.
- SEND Relief is actively helping meet practical needs of people in disaster-torn areas of not only our country, but around the world, including Syria and Turkey following devastating earthquakes, and wartorn Ukraine. Hungry are fed, displaced are

- sheltered, belongings are rescued, and the Gospel is shared.
- The Sexual Abuse Implementation Task Force unrolled a huge resource for our churches. We can go to sbcabuseprevention.com to screen a candidate for ministry for a known legal history of being a sexual abuser.

There were, however, some sobering events as usual:

- Messengers voted to uphold the Executive Committee's expulsion of the three churches who appealed to the convention to remain in the SBC, including the very influential Saddleback Church of southern California. One of the issues for disfellowshipping was over whether a woman could carry any title of pastor when the Baptist Faith & Message clearly states that only a man can hold that office. The BFM statement is a long-held Baptist tradition. However, other long-held Baptist traditions were violated in order to uphold the former.
  - ♦ First, it is a Southern Baptist tradition to keep cooperation for our Great Commission efforts primary and to not allow minor issues to break our cooperation. An example would be in 2013, when we voted to keep Calvinists in our fold for the sake of our mission.
  - Secondly, it is in our constitution, and thus our tradition, that "the convention does not claim and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any other Baptist body, whether it is a church, auxiliary organization, association, or a convention." Each church's local autonomy, along with the right to call its leaders whatever they choose in faith, is now being subjected to the Convention's prevailing opinions or they risk expulsion. In fact, the decisions of this convention now put 1,928 churches in violation because they have titled some of their women leaders as pastors. At least one other very influential church in our convention already announced the day after the annual meeting that they will forego the likely pending witch-hunt and voluntarily withdrew.
  - ♦ Lastly, it is a strong Southern Baptist tradition that the BFM is merely a statement that is generally agreed upon in our convention. There has previously been room for disagreement on non-essential doctrines listed in the BFM. The expulsion of a church that practices only one difference with the BFM elevates that document from a confession to a creed. Baptist cries have long been: "No creed but Christ, no book but the Bible." Apparently no more.

Even though there is reason for sobered prayer, we will remain focused on the positives of what we are doing together for the advancement of the Kingdom of God.

The Deacon Body would like to start a non-perishable food collection day on the Sundays that we celebrate the Lord's Supper. Boxes or other containers will be available in the foyer to collect the non-perishable items that are donated. If we use the last Sunday of each month as a reminder, it will keep our food pantry stocked, and also help to remind all of us that we have a way of giving back to our community on this special day of remembering the sacrifice Jesus made for us. ## **Operation Christmas Child**

An ends of the earth story: Bringing the gospel to the Himba

Village leaders gathered around the fire and pleaded with their ancestors' spirits. The drought seemed endless, families were falling deeper into poverty, and the witch doctor's promises of healing had failed time and time again. The Himba people in Namibia call it the holy fire- it's how they communicate with and worship their ancestors, whom they view as gods. In a culture defined by traditions, the holy fire is one of the most important.

The Himba are nomadic livestock farmers who live in small mud huts without electricity or running water. They don't have a written language, so the Himba are oral storytellers who often fill their days with singing and chanting. Their physical appearance is distinctive, from the red clay mixture that women spread over their skin to elaborate headdresses resembling cattle horns, from skirts made of calfskin to sandals pieced together from old car tires. Himba families are often plagued by poverty to the point that it's not uncommon for children to eat only one meal a day. The Himba have been largely forgotten people for many years. That is, until God burdened the heart of a pastor to take the Gospel of Jesus where it had never been. . .

Pastor Rizera Hipakua has done some hard things. He endured ridicule from his family after becoming a Christian. He obeyed God's call to devote his life to the pastorate, even though it meant financial uncertainty. But taking the Gospel to people who had never heard the Name of Jesus would be his hardest challenge yet. How would the Himba

respond? Would they allow him into their villages? How would he explain the Gospel to people who worshipped the spirit of their ancestors? To people who wouldn't be able to read the Bible—even if one existed in their language?

Pastor Rizera and his church members were in the middle of a week of prayer and fasting, asking God how to begin outreach among the Himba, when an individual came to the church to share about a Samaritan's Purse project called Operation Christmas Child. The first Himba village that Pastor Rizera visited with Operation Christmas Child was a few hours away in Ombaka. He invited church members and other local believers to help him with the outreach event. They distributed shoebox gifts, presented the Gospel, and enjoyed getting to know the Himba families. This first Gospel outreach among the Himba was more successful than Pastor Rizera ever expected, but he had no intention of stopping there. He asked Alma, a Sunday school teacher and local schoolteacher, to lead the Ombaka children through The Greatest Journey, the Samaritan's Purse follow-up discipleship program for shoebox recipients.

Several children and adults in Ombaka came to saving faith in Jesus Christ as a result of this initial shoebox outreach event and The Greatest Journey. They were so eager to continue learning that they started gathering regularly under a large tree in the village for worship and prayer. Over time, Pastor Rizera saw God transform the lives of people who were once without spiritual hope. They no longer met at the holy fire to pray

to their ancestors. Alcoholism slowly faded away. The children, now more respectful and obedient to their parents, sang Scripture praise songs created from traditional tribal tunes.

"God breathed new life into them. They are a new creation. They were a people in darkness—now they are living in the Light of Christ," Pastor Rizera said.

A few years after the outreach event, Samaritan's Purse partnered with both the Seed Company, an affiliate of Wycliffe Bible Translators, and Christians in Ombaka to build a sanctuary on land donated by the village chief.
